35 years—wow! Children's Cancer Connection celebrated its 35th anniversary in 2023. As I reflect on the year, I am filled with gratitude for all that we were able to accomplish over the course of our anniversary year. Families, donors, volunteers, and staff all play an important role in carrying out CCC's mission, and we have much to celebrate!


Children's Cancer Connection began as a standalone oncology camp in 1988. Thanks to your support, CCC has grown to now offer nearly 60 programs to 834 families. In the past year, Teen Programs have grown significantly, with Exploration Expedition and Teen Camps both reaching full capacity (and having waitlists!). Family programs and support programs have expanded to offer Fall Family Outings in both Central and Eastern lowa, and monthly Kids Club and Teen Hangout programs have also increased in attendance. 2023 also marked CCC's first full year back to normal Camp Heart Connection Camps, hosting all six camp programs (Oncology, Sibling, Teen, Day and Fall and Spring Family camps) without any pandemic restrictions!

CCC's Jeff and Deb Hansen Home for Hope facility in Johnston underwent a full renovation in the spring of 2023 making the facility even more child-friendly and accessible to all. There's a beautiful Prairie Meadows (multi-purpose) Room for programming and a comfortable "Sparkle Room" that serves as a gathering space to watch movies and play video games. CCC is now able to host cooking and baking programs in the spacious kitchen and store Day Camper lunches in the huge refrigerator. A Gold Ribbon Walkway begins at the front of the building leading visitors around to the backyard where an inclusive Variety Star Playground and basketball sport court are located. The Gold Ribbon Walkway serves as a memorial to the lowa children lost to pediatric cancer, and the beautiful paver patio with a bright green shade sail is a popular gathering place for visitors to the play area. The outdoor space has guickly become a favorite spot for children and teens attending programs, providing a safe area for all to enjoy outdoor recreation while forming connections with others on their cancer journey. CCC's outdoor space is also open to the general public when CCC is not holding programs.

What is next for CCC in its 36th year? We will continue to provide quality programs to support pediatric cancer families and grow its increasing reach. CCC currently serves families in 79 of lowa's 99 counties, and it is a goal to serve everyone that is living, treated or diagnosed with pediatric cancer in the state. We are working to establish strategic partnerships with hospitals and nonprofit organizations within and beyond state borders to strengthen our combined networks of support for families of children with pediatric cancer, and to ensure these families are informed about CCC and the support services we provide.

We are excited for 2024 and beyond as we continue to connect and care for lowa families affected by childhood cancer.

My Journey Book is a place to organize treatment information and take notes as well.

Welcome Box includes information about CCC's free services and fun items like a blanket, water bottle, distraction toy and a Louie LionHeart® stuffed animal.

Courage Store® at Blank Children's Hospital allows kids to redeem the Bravery Bucks® they have earned.

Beads4Bravery® program allows families to collect a bead for every step and milestone to tell the story of their unique journey.

Hospital Activities at the University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital provide crafts, games and other activities to children undergoing treatment.



Support programs & outings are offered to give families the opportunity to connect with others who relate to their experience.

Family Outings help families grow connections across the state.

Kids Club helps kids of all ages connect with other kids at CCC.

Back-to-School Bash is a fun-filled family event with free school supplies and the chance to connect before school starts.

Comfort Connection is for caregivers of an oncology child to connect with others on similar journeys.

I think it's amazing that CCC is there for the entire family through the whole journey. That sentiment is something that we hold very near and dear to our hearts. Especially in my family's situation where we have one child here with us and then we have another one that we remember always. I will be forever indebted to CCC for what they've done for my family.

Evelyn is a spunky, courageous, very kind, and energetic girl. She is really funny and supportive of others. She wraps you around her finger and has a way of just making you feel really comfortable with her as soon as you meet her. She loves crafts, arts and is obsessed with cats. She loves to play outside, rock climb, and kayak, and she's not afraid to get dirty, but she's also quite the girly girl. She loves getting her nails done. She loves Barbies and Legos. There's not a lot of things Evelyn doesn't like to do. She's a well-rounded child.

In August of 2020, she was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia. She went through two years and two months of treatment. The first six months were really tough—really hard on her. We entered the maintenance phase and things kind of got easier, but there were some hiccups that she experienced. She thankfully rang the bell in October of 2022.

Hard isn't really the word I would use. It was excruciating, to be honest. She was only 5 when she was diagnosed, so trying to make sure she understood what was happening to her along with coming to terms with it as parents and letting our families know in terms that they would understand was very hard, but we all got stronger through it, and thankfully she's doing well.

Evelyn loves to do **Kids Club** the first Saturday of every month at Children's Cancer Connection. We sign up religiously. When I drop her off, I don't even get a "bye mom." She's there, and she's ready to go. Evelyn's been to the **Spring Break Specials**, and she's been involved with Day Camp too. She loves doing that. And then there's the **Back to School Bash**. Anything that we're able to sign her up for through CCC, we do—she loves it.

Treatment was really tough. I quit my job to be her caretaker for a while, so we were living on a one-income household. **CCC's free programs** are why she's able to do as much as she's doing with them.

Evelyn struggled with port access the entire treatment because she had a port infection really early on, and that was trauma that followed her, so those **Bravery Bucks** and going to **CCC's Courage Store** were huge motivators for her.

We also had the **My Journey Book**, which was really helpful for her dad and I. I opened that a lot during the beginning of her treatment when things were really tough. There are phone numbers to call in there, people to contact, and it just kind of organizes everything.

CCC is a place where Evelyn can meet other kids who either have gone through this journey or have watched their siblings go through this journey. It's a place where she can connect.

It's a place where Mike and myself have met other parents—it's always nice to connect with other people who have gone through this journey in one way or another and understand what you've gone through as a family.

A little back story on my family—I have a little sister that passed away from cancer back in 2014. My sister and brother—Evelyn's aunt and uncle—go to CCC programs frequently. Being able to see the **Gold Ribbon Walkway** with our sister's name on it helps, not only my sister and brother, but also other siblings. It's nice to know that people don't forget about your loved ones after they pass away. It's a beautiful remembrance of them.

CCC is and has been, and always will be, a huge tool that families and children are able to use. Without CCC, I don't think Evelyn's journey would have gone as smoothly, and she would not have made those connections with other people during a time where she wasn't able to make those connections with others in a normal setting.





PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

When CCC moved to its location in Johnston in December of 2021, it had a goal of increasing program attendance. 2023 was an exciting year for just that! The Eastern Iowa Fall Family Outing more than doubled its attendance over the past year with nearly 70 people attending. CCC reached its highest ever registration number for Kids Clubs and Comfort Connection in the fall, and teen programming had wait lists because of the popularity. New in 2023, CCC offered outings in the Des Moines metro area as part of CCC's Teen Hangouts, and those included a bowling alley, arcade, and Sky Zone trampoline park. Camp Heart Connection programming returned in full force with zero pandemic restrictions, and additionally, staff resumed in-person hospital activities at the University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital with children currently on treatment. Not only that, but for the first time ever, CCC is now visiting Blank Children's Hospital and its family room monthly as well. Staff will be available to pediatric oncology families for whatever they need—from program information, to helping children retrieve their Beads4Bravery or Courage Store prizes. Rounding out the My Journey Series, a digital version of CCC's My Journey Book was officially launched in May, and it provides a digital format to CCC families for more accessibility. We're looking forward to continuing this momentum into 2024 and beyond!



Evan Oppman was barely a year old in 2018 when he was diagnosed with stage IV neuroblastoma. He had a spunky spirit, sweet smile and silly personality. Sadly, Evan passed away in May 2020 following 18 months of treatment. While Evan got to utilize **Children's Cancer Connection's Bravery Bucks** and the **Courage Store**, and the family received **Winter Wishes** gifts in 2019, it's important to families like the Oppmans that CCC can support caregivers and siblings through their entire journeys.

"CCC is a unique organization. Their support targets whole families, not just the cancer patient, and it is beneficial for the mental and emotional health of family members," Joy said.

As Joy, husband Nathan, son Henry and daughter Violet continue to navigate their world without Evan, Joy said "CCC helps us keep connected to this piece of our past while providing us with ongoing connections to people who have walked this road and can be part of our present and our future." They found their safe place to connect at **CCC's Family Camp and Day Camp**. Joy said she hopes to attend the parent support group **Comfort Connection** in the future.

"Outside of the cancer community, a lot of people get stuck and don't know what to say when we mention Evan. But he's a huge part of our lives, so we are going to talk about him!" Joy said. "The other CCC families get that, and that freedom to share about him is a blessing." Evan's memory also lives on through CCC's new **Gold Ribbon Walkway**.

"I love that Evan has a paver on the Gold Ribbon Walkway," said his mom Joy Oppman. "His life made a huge impact on our family, and we will love him forever. But the world continues on, and we know that his life slowly becomes a memory to most people who are not family. Putting his name on the walkway reminds others of his story. And for a few moments at least, we know that someone else will be thinking about him with us."

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They also continue to support families whose oncology child has passed away. Going through oncology treatment has similarities to fighting a long, drawn-out war, and it changes how a family looks at life and how they function. Having a place where warrior families can connect socially is a great outlet and source of encouragement.
